2017 Problem-Solving Courts Training Calendar

4/13/2017 Certification Process Training (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is intended for the coordinators/leaders of drug courts that serve adult populations (Adult Drug Court, DWI Court, Hybrid Programs, and Family Dependency Drug Court). This training will provide a comprehensive overview of the new drug court certification process. Topics will include integration of best practices in drug court operations, the certification application, available training and technical assistance, and the SCAO site visit process.

4/18/2017 WebGrants Training (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is intended for anyone who has never used the WebGrants system, particularly team members in an adult drug court that does not receive grant funding. This training will introduce attendees to WebGrants, teach them how to use it, and demonstrate a step-by-step approach to operating the WebGrants system and submitting the adult drug court's application for Certification.

4/19/2017 DCCMIS Training (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

DCCMIS Training is designed for anyone who enters data for a drug, sobriety, family dependency, juvenile, veterans, or mental health court. The computer training room at the Hall of Justice provides the opportunity for hands-on, beginner training. Class participants will go through the entire process of entering and tracking data – from the initial screening process to discharge from the program. Additionally, the training includes an administration component, so courts can learn how to best use DCCMIS for each member of the team. The class also covers some shortcuts in DCCMIS, including using bulk tasks and available reports.

5/4/2017 Fundamentals of Problem-Solving Courts (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is intended for new team members, programs in the planning stages, or teams needing refresher training. The training will focus on basic fundamentals and best practices for each program type (drug, sobriety, family dependency, juvenile, Veterans Treatment Court, and Mental Health Court) and will be discussed in large group and small breakout sessions.

5/17/2017 DCAS Basic Training (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is offered to those who have had the DCCMIS training and are new to DCAS or would like a refresher on the basics of interpreting the data output, building study groups, and using data to measure program performance.

5/18/2017 DCAS Training for Mental Health Courts (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is specific to Mental Health Court team members who have had the DCCMIS training. Attendees will learn the basics of interpreting data output, building study groups, using data for reporting purposes, and analyzing performance measures specific to mental health courts.

7/12/2017 Drug Court Networking Forum (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

The Drug Court Forum is an event open to anyone involved with a drug, sobriety, family dependency, or juvenile court in Michigan. Attendees are given the opportunity to network and share ideas, and to discuss hot topics in treatment courts. There will be small group and plenary sessions, with the small-group sessions being separated by court type. Because space at the Hall of Justice is limited, courts should select 3-4 people to attend and represent your program(s).

8/15/2017 Mental Health Court Topic Training (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is open to all mental health courts in Michigan. The training will focus on topics pertinent to the operations of a mental health court and to participant needs.

8/17/2017 DCCMIS Training (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

DCCMIS Training is designed for anyone who enters data for a drug, sobriety, family dependency, juvenile, Veterans Treatment Court, or Mental Health Court. The computer training room at the Hall of Justice provides the opportunity for hands-on, beginner training. Class participants will go through the entire process of entering and tracking data – from the initial screening process to discharge from the program. Additionally, the training includes an administration component, so courts can learn how to best use DCCMIS for each member of the team. The class also covers some shortcuts in DCCMIS, including using bulk tasks and available reports.

8/23/2017 Process and Outcomes Evaluation (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training will cover the differences between a process evaluation and an outcomes evaluation, and describe how data apply to each type of evaluation. Attendees must be knowledgeable about the Drug Court Analytic System (DCAS) database and its variables, however, this is NOT a DCAS training. Those who will benefit most from this training are users of DCAS for progress reporting, and those who are responsible for compiling data about their program for their team and/or community.

9/14/2017 DCAS Basic Training (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is offered to those who have had the DCCMIS training and are new to DCAS or would like a refresher on the basics of interpreting the data output, building study groups, and using data to measure program performance.

9/26/2017 Judicial Role and Leadership in Problem-Solving Courts (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

Research indicates that the role of the judge is a key element in the success of our drug treatment courts. This training will address the roles and responsibilities of the problem-solving court judge -- including leadership of the PSC team, leadership in the community, and the importance of judicial interaction with the participant. The training will also cover important topics such as confidentiality and due process. New research and recent case law makes this training essential for both new and experienced problem-solving court judges as well as program coordinators.

10/16/2017 Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is required for Problem-Solving Courts receiving first-time SCAO funding specific to Medication Assisted Treatment in FY 2018. This training will cover an overview of Medication Assisted Treatments, integrating MATs into a problem-solving court, MAT guidelines, and MAT outcomes.

10/23/2017 Fundamentals of Problem-Solving Courts (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is intended for new team members, programs in the planning stages, or teams needing refresher training. The training will focus on basic fundamentals and best practices for each program type (drug, sobriety, family dependency, juvenile, Veterans Treatment Court, and Mental Health Court) and will be discussed in large-group and small breakout sessions.

11/2/2017 Veterans Treatment Court Forum (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

The Veterans Court Forum is an event open to anyone who works with a Veterans Treatment Court in Michigan. Attendees are given the opportunity to network and share ideas, and to discuss hot topics regarding veteran's affairs, treatment courts, and the criminal justice system. There will be small-group and plenary sessions. Because space at the Hall of Justice is limited, courts should select 4-6 people to attend and represent your team.

11/16/2017 Mental Health Court Forum (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This forum is intended for all mental health court team members. Topics for discussion, in large and small groups, will focus on common issues that impact participants and operations of mental health court.

12/7/2017 DCCMIS Training (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

DCCMIS Training is designed for anyone who enters data for a drug, sobriety, family dependency, juvenile, Veterans Treatment Court, or Mental Health Court. The computer training room at the Hall of Justice provides the opportunity for hands-on, beginner training.
