Submit Nominations by August 10 for 2018 Child Welfare Awards

LANSING, MI, July 13, 2018 - The Foster Care Review Board (FCRB) is accepting nominations until August 10 for the 2018 Child Welfare Awards, which are given every year in the fall to individuals who have demonstrated outstanding service to Michigan's foster children.

“The awards program provides a forum for recognition of the excellent work that is performed by child welfare professionals who work diligently to overcome systemic barriers and go above and beyond policy, court rule, and statutory standards to help ensure the safety, well-being, and timely permanency for children and families served by our foster care system,” said FCRB Program Manager James Novell.

Finalists will be chosen by a panel of Foster Care Review Board members, and award winners are chosen by a panel of child welfare professionals and advocates, including award winners from the past year. The Foster Care Review Board (FCRB) provides independent third-party review of cases in the state child foster care system. The FCRB also hears appeals by foster parents who believe that children are being unnecessarily removed from their care. Established by the Michigan Legislature in 1984, the Foster Care Review Boards Act helps ensure that children are safe and well cared for while in the state foster care system, and that their cases are being moved toward permanency in a timely and efficient manner.

The program is administratively housed within the State Court Administrative Office as a means of providing support to local courts in their monitoring of the state child welfare agency's (Michigan Department of Health & Human Services) care and supervision of children under the court's jurisdiction for child abuse or neglect.
